2007 JUNIOR RANCH RODEO

The rodeo was planned for the entertainment of children, and to teach them the way of the ranch hand. It is designated for them to have fun and to learn about teamwork with children of different ages. Along the way everyone who gets involved in the activities or as a spectator will have a really fun time.

1. Each team will consist of four members. There will be three age groups: PeeWee, Junior, and Senior teams.
2. **The PeeWee Team** - Children, 3 to 7 years of age. The team must have one 4, 5, or 6-year-old. No more than two seven-year-olds. Each team must consist of 4 team members.
3. **Junior Team** Children, 4 to 11 years of age. This team must have members between the ages of 4 through 7. One member between the ages of 8 through 11 years. This team cannot have more than two 11-year-olds on a team. You must have a team of 4 members.
4. **Senior Team** Children, 6 to 14 years of age as of January 1, 2007. The team cannot have more than one 13-year-old and one 14-year-old. You must have 4 team members.

There will be four events: **Pony Express Race, Steer Doctoring, Wild Cow Milking, and Calf Branding.**

Rules:

1. The Bucket Calf project is open to all youth, ages four (4) years to eight (8) years of age and not enrolled in any 4-H project.
2. Calves must be born after April 1, 2007 and prior to July 1, 2007.
3. Exhibitors will be allowed to show only ONE Calf.
4. All Bucket Calves will be assigned to a specific area to be tied.
5. All calves must be tied with neck ropes in addition to halters.
6. All calves must be on the bucket or bottle at Fair time (No nurse cows).
7. All calves must be halter broken.
8. Calves may be of any breed or sex.
9. Calves will be released at 6:30 p.m. Saturday, August 4th.
10. Entries close Friday, July 27th, 2007. Enter for this class at the Extension Office.
11. Fair rules and regulations on stalls, care of livestock and health are to be adhered to. In order to make this a fun and positive experience, parents will be allowed to assist their children.
12. Ownership of calves is not required by participants.
13. All animals will be checked by a vet at check-in.
14. Bucket calves should not come to the fairgrounds until Friday, August 3rd

Rules:

1. Contestants must be 4-H or FFA members.
2. Proof of ownership by June 1, 2007.
3. Record Books are due by Friday July 27 by 4:30 p.m. at the Platte County Extension Office.
4. Animals do not have to be fitted and judges do not consider fitting or showmanship.
5. Heifers must show on a halter. Pairs will show loose.
6. To show a cow and calf, the cow must have been shown as a yearling heifer the previous year.
7. If the contestant has more than one animal to show, another 4-H or FFA member may show the other animal(s).
8. Cow and calf pairs (or heifers not showing in Junior Show) must be on the fairgrounds by 11:00 a.m. on the day of the show.

(Cows, calves and yearlings may also show in Junior Division Classes for which they qualify on Thursday. If so, they are due on the fairgrounds by 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 31st.)

RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitor must be a resident of Platte County Wyoming Trade Area.
2. Only 2007 products will be shown except in cases where stated otherwise. If evidence is produced to show that this rule is violated, the entry shall be removed from exhibition. Only those classes shown in this book shall be exhibited or judged.
3. Youth Exhibitors must submit fair entries not later than Friday, July 13th, 4:30pm. No fax entries will be accepted.
4. For entry and judging schedules, please refer to specific department. All livestock exhibits must remain in place until 7:00 a.m. Sunday. All Open Class and 4-H & FFA exhibits in the Open Class Exhibit Hall and 4-H building will be released between 7:00 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. on Saturday. The Fair Board is not responsible for exhibits left after 10:00 a.m. on Sunday. The buildings will open at 7:00 a.m. on Sunday.
5. The Platte County Fair or its management will not be responsible for accidents (or fire or theft) that may occur on the grounds to persons or property, although, every precaution to guard against them will be taken. THE FAIR BOARD HAS THE RIGHT TO REMOVE FROM THE PREMISES ANYONE EXHIBITING INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR.
6. The distribution of handbills or other advertising matter is strictly prohibited and no tacking or posting advertising bills, cards, etc. will be permitted on any of the buildings or elsewhere. No person will be allowed to do any soliciting for any paper, merchandise or articles unless they first obtain permission from the coordinator and pay the required fee.
7. For special exhibits and concessions, see Fair Coordinator. The Fair Board reserves the right to close any concession at any time and remove it from the grounds.
8. Open class livestock classes will only be offered when at least two unrelated and non-junior show entries are received.

PROTESTS

1. All protests must be filed with the coordinator and must state plainly the cause for complaint and appeal, and must be made within five days following the final date of the Fair.

CAMPGROUNDS

1. Camper parking will be on a lottery system. Please call the Fair Office (322-9504) to register. Lottery slots will be given on July 23, 2007. No camper parking will be permitted prior to July 23, 2007.
2. All campers MUST check in at the fair office.
3. 12 additional camper spots are available.
4. Camper parking fee—\$35.00 for the week.

JUDGES

1. Judges are requested to read carefully the general and special rules under which this Fair is managed, previous to entering their duties, making special note of and marking all rules.
2. The judges will please report to the management before entering upon their duties.
3. Judges must not award prizes to unworthy exhibits. It is the intention of the management that no premium is offered to any animal or article which is not deserving. This rule will be strictly adhered to whether there be competition or not.
4. No judges shall make any award other than those specified in the premium list, without the written consent of the Secretary.
5. Judges shall report to the superintendent any exhibitor or exhibitors who in any way, whether in person or by agent, interferes with them during their work, or shows any disrespect to them. The superintendent shall, at his/her discretion, demand the exhibitor to withdraw from the competition if guilty of such acts.
6. At the discretion of the judges, any exhibit not promptly presented when called for, will be ruled out and barred from competition.

SUPERINTENDENTS

1. It shall be the duty of each superintendent to inform the judges of his/her department of the rules and regulations governing awards, and to urge them to read carefully the rules before entering their work.
2. Each Superintendent is charged with caring for and placing of the exhibits by class number in his/her department. THE SUPERINTENDENT MUST SEE THAT ALL AWARDS ARE DULY AND PROPERLY ENTERED, as it is only upon this record that the premium can be paid.
3. The superintendent in charge MUST CHECK THE ENTRIES AND KEEP THE EXHIBIT FILE IN ORDER FOR HIS/HER DEPARTMENT SO THAT THE SAME WILL SHOW WHAT ARTICLES OR ANIMALS WERE PASSED UPON BY JUDGES.
4. Where awards are made in all classes, the superintendent in charge must see that the name, registry number, etc. of the exhibits awarded prizes are noted on the tags and/or call sheets.
5. Each superintendent will be informed of time of judging in his/her department. He/she will endeavor to have all exhibitors present and urge them to lend their assistance by having entries ready.
6. All livestock Superintendents will be responsible for collecting health papers and turning them into the fair office.
7. All Superintendents will oversee Herdsmanship in their respective areas. All stalls, pens and surrounding areas are to be kept clean and free of trash.

GOVERNING ANIMALS AT PLATTE COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS

All animals presented for exhibition or competition at the Platte County Fairgrounds will be considered under quarantine and not eligible for exhibit until a certificate of veterinarian inspection, documenting that the animal(s) to be exhibited are in good health and free of contagious disease, is presented to superintendent for review prior to unloading on grounds.

No animals will be allowed to exhibit or compete at the Platte County Fair without a current certificate of veterinarian inspection. **Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for all animals except rabbits are only valid for thirty (30) days. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for rabbits must be issued within forty-eight (48) hours of the show.**

The Platte County Fair Board's veterinarian(s) may implement any special inspection or quarantine procedure that is believed necessary to prevent the spread of contagious diseases to humans or other animals. An animal showing symptoms of a contagious disease shall be placed under quarantine or removed from the County Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Platte County Fair Board's veterinarian(s). *The professional judgment of the Platte County Fair Board's veterinarian(s) will be the final deciding factor in all animal health decisions.*

The Platte County Fair Board's management team reserves the right to develop, employ, and enforce individual animal health inspections at any time. The Management of fair advisors will make this decision if they feel it is necessary for the health and/or well being of animals, public health, or other specific health concerns.

All livestock entering the Platte County Fairgrounds will be required to be health inspected at the designated check point, except for horses, dogs, rabbits and cats. These animals will be required to get health inspections from the veterinarian prior to entering the grounds.

All vehicles with livestock will enter the east arena gate. After passing inspection they will enter fairgrounds through the track area and around the arena. Animals will not be permitted to unload and stall until health papers are turned into area superintendent. Animals will not be permitted on the grounds to stalls prior to 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, July 31, 2007.

LIVESTOCK CHECK IN TIME — 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Only livestock with health inspections will be permitted to unload, and stall signs will be posted. This is for your safety and to insure all livestock is healthy and free of disease. We want everyone to have a safe and healthy fair.

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

1. Only bona-fide 4-H or FFA members may compete in any of the classes in this department. 4-H members must turn 9 years old by December 31, 2007 and not passed 19th birthday before December 31, 2006.
2. A review board will deal with any questionable situation that may arise during the county fair. The review board will be composed of two Fair Board members, 4-H Leaders' Council President, 4-H club leader/FFA Advisor from club to which member belongs, Division Superintendent, Livestock Committee Member of species in question, and 4-H Educator.
3. Exhibit must be the result of the exhibitors project for which he or she is enrolled this year.
4. Only on recommendation of the judge and with the approval of the department superintendent will additional classes be added to the PREMIUMS list.
5. Members must be present to show their own animals when judging takes place. If unforeseen circumstances arise, the superintendent must be notified of who will be showing in place of member.
6. Weigh backs will only be allowed for those animals that are: within 20 lbs. of the weight limits for market beef, and within 2 lbs. of the weight limits for market sheep, swine and goats. No other weigh backs will be allowed. Animals will be taken off the scale, the scale will be zeroed, and then the animal put back on the scale immediately. Animals **WILL NOT** be allowed to go back to their pens or given any water.
7. 1ST and 2ND PLACES IN THE JUNIOR DIVISION CAN GO INTO THE OPEN CLASS ONLY IF THERE IS OUTSIDE COMPETITION.
8. Herdsman AWARDS in Beef, Swine, Sheep, Dairy, all Goats and Poultry will be awarded to individuals or clubs doing the best job keeping their areas clean during the fair.
9. Superintendents in their division have the authority to ask that exhibitors remove their exhibit if animal(s) are not cared for in a husband like manner. Unruly animals, or those that get away more than twice, may be asked to be removed from the Fairgrounds.
10. LIVESTOCK FITTING RULE: Safety to the member and animal should be kept foremost in mind. No one except bona fide 4-H or FFA members may help each other fit exhibitors' animals (bona fide 4-H/FFA members are those traditional members currently enrolled in the county program.) Consequences for those parents or other adults who are helping 4-Hers or FFA members fit their animals: everyone will be given one warning, then that child will not be allowed to show or sell. This will be enforced by all committee members. Any individual determined to be using any type of tranquilizing drug on their animal(s) during the fair forfeits the right to show or sell the animal. Exhibitor will also be asked to remove the animal from fairgrounds for any other unsportsmanlike behavior.
11. GENERAL CARE: Feeding, watering, cleaning pens/stalls, etc. of animals during the Platte County Fair should be the responsibility of the 4-H or FFA member. Older members are encouraged to help younger members. (PARENTS are discouraged from caring for animals during the fair. Parental assistance should only happen when safety is a concern for youth.)
12. All livestock brought to the fair must be ready to show (cattle and horses halter broke).
13. No boars, stallions, dairy bulls, beef bulls, or billies will be allowed in any 4-H showmanship event.
14. Showmanship contestants must own and show their own animal.
15. Any FFA or 4-H youth that takes Jr. Livestock Sale animals to Wyoming State Fair is still responsible for delivering that animal to the buyer of his or her animal. In the case of a resale animal the resale amount must be reimbursed to the buyer of said animal if animal cannot be delivered.
16. A beef sifting committee composed of the beef superintendents, 4-H agent, and appropriate breed association representative will review all entries prior to the show. The sifting committee may change any beef animal from one class to another or disqualify if necessary. All decisions of the sifting committee are final and may not be appealed.
17. At the discretion of the superintendents, classes may be created or combined, depending on the number of entries and breeds available. As a general rule, if there are two or less entries in a class, that class will be combined with another class to enhance competition. Regardless of the number of entries, all exhibitors will be allowed to show.
18. **No animals will be allowed on the Fairgrounds prior to 9:00am, Tuesday, July 31st.**
19. All Livestock exhibits must remain in place until 7:00am Sunday morning at which time animals will be released. Exception: Horses, Rabbits, and Calves born in 2007 are not required to remain on the fairgrounds for the entire week.

LIVESTOCK SALE GUIDELINES AND REGULATIONS

ANIMALS PROPERLY CARED FOR

Animals must be fed and watered and stalls cleaned, or animals will be sent home.

SALE ORDER

When you leave the show ring, tell your Livestock Superintendent you are going to sell an animal. Be polite and concise. Check the bulletin board to see if your superintendent listed all sellers. If not, let superintendent know. Only if it is our mistake will you be added to the sale order after it is made! **ALSO**, check bulletin board Friday afternoon so you will know when you sell. Please be ready and on time to sell, don't make us come look for you! **No substitution of animals will be allowed.**

NO SALES & CHECK DEDUCTIONS

Once an animal enters the sale ring, it must be sold to the highest bidder. No sales are not allowed. There will be a commission taken out of every check. In addition, brand inspection fees are also taken out of beef, sheep and goat checks.

SALE RESPONSIBILITIES

After you have sold your animal in the sale ring, someone will help you put your animal back while you take the sales receipt and a buyer board to the buyer, be sure to ask and see if your animal is to be a buy back. **BE POLITE AND THANK THEM.** Then **RETURN** the sales receipt to the front table and check on your animal and make sure it is back in its pen. Remember that the animal is still your responsibility until you deliver it to the buyer. You must feed, water and care for it until you deliver it to the buyer. It must stay on the fair grounds until at least 7:00 a.m., Sunday, August 5, 2007.

BUY BACKS

A buy back list will be posted on Saturday. Check and see if you are on it. If so, be there to help load your animal. If you are going to State Fair with your sale animal, let us know immediately or it will be gone with the rest of the buy back animals. **The Fair Board has requested that Buy Back animals be loaded out on Sunday morning, if possible.** All animals sold, whether a buy back animal or not, must be delivered to, or arrangements made for delivery of the animal, within fourteen (14) days (by September 2, 2007) of the end of State Fair. If the animal is not delivered, or prior arrangements made for delivery, the sale will be treated as a "no sale" and the buyer will be refunded their money and the seller will keep the animal. **No resale of buy back animals will be allowed on the fairgrounds.**

THANK YOU NOTES

Thank you notes should be neatly written and in an **unsealed, addressed and stamped envelope** and submitted to the Extension Office soon after county fair, no later than September 14, 2007 or you run the risk of forfeiting your sale check. If your thank you note is in the Extension Office when checks are ready, your check will be mailed to you. If not, you will have to bring a thank you note into the Extension Office in person to pick up your check. Remember, you must write a thank you note to your buyer(s) and bring it/them into the Extension Office before your check will be mailed!! Checks **WILL NOT** be given to anyone but the seller. **NO ONE...NOT MOM, DAD, BROTHER, SISTER, LEADER...** will be allowed to pick it up for you!!

Rules:

1. All livestock must be in place by 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, July 31st, or they will NOT be allowed to show or sell, unless unforeseen circumstances arise.
2. All beef projects must be tied in their assigned stalls from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. (exception on show day). This will be enforced by all committee members. If beef projects are not tied in stalls during the hours specified, they will be given one warning, then all PREMIUM money will be withheld.
3. Only proper show equipment will be allowed in show ring; i.e. leather, nylon or rope show halters. No metal, mechanical or halter breaking devices will be allowed.
4. All market beef exhibited must be in the name of one individual owner by February 1, 2007, which is ownership deadline. All breeding beef exhibited must be in the name of one individual owner by June 1, 2007, which is ownership deadline.
5. Market class is open to steers and heifers that were properly tagged. Must be born after January 1, 2006. Judge to determine if Market quality to sell. **Minimum weight 1,050 lbs. Maximum weight 1,500 lbs, to sell.**

Ownership: The dog lives in the same residence with the 4-H member and is owned by the 4-H youth or immediate family member (grandparents, mother, father, sister, brother).

Co-Ownership: Ownership ID Sheet extends beyond the family with two or more names on the papers to prove co-ownership exists. One of the names on the ID Sheet must be the 4-H member's or an immediate family member's.

Dog Training Contract: The 4-H member may enter into an agreement to train someone else's dog in situations that may benefit the member, the dog, or both. This arrangement is used for families with the inability to own a dog. **The training contract should not be used as a substitute for normal dog ownership.**

The co-ownership agreement, training contract and dog ID Sheets all must be completed and submitted to the Platte County Extension Office before May 1 of the current 4-H year.

4. All animal entries of bona fide Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization for rabies, distemper & parvo. Rabies shots must be renewed as per state veterinary guidelines. **No animals will be allowed to exhibit at the Platte Co. Fair and the Wyoming State Fair without a valid Animal Health Certificate. Shot records will be checked.**
5. Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
6. Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
7. Spayed, monorchid and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
8. Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
9. The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
10. Judging of classes will be done with AKC rules as guidelines; however, specific Wyoming 4-H Dog Show Rules (Rule numbers 1, 2, 3 & 4) will supersede AKC Rules.
11. High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw score plus 5 additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
12. **All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Platte County Fair rules prohibit any dog from being any place but the campground and the site of the dog show. State source of recipe for jelly products and pickle products if other than USDA.
4. **All canned goods should be exhibited without rings.** For instructions, check with your Extension office or the UW CES Nutrition Website: <http://www.uwyo.edu/cesnutrition> on US Food & Nutrition Publications.
5. Canned goods must be exhibited in regulation canning jars (half pint, pint, or quart). All jelly products (jellies, jams, conserves, marmalades, butters) must be processed in a boiling water bath to be judged. Paraffin sealed jars will not be judged. Jelly products may be exhibited in one-half (½) cup regulation jars. 6. For food safety reasons, meat jerky entries must be prepared using the boiling brine method recommended by the University of Wyoming Cooperative Extension Service, and the recipe must accompany the product.
